Deontological ethics, in philosophy, ethical theories that place special emphasis on the relationship between duty and the morality of human actions. The term deontology is derived from the Greek deon, "duty," and logos, "science.". In deontological ethics an action is considered morally good because of some characteristic of the action itself, not because the product of the action is good.
